
I see quite a bit of the town of Feilding now!

at the beginning of this new term remind us to: Love as you love us.

Look to Jesus for guidance as a role model of compassion and aroha.

Staying in touch

Learning Hub:

During lockdown we developed a google site called the Learning Hub: https://sites.google.com/stpatsnapier.school.nz/home-learning We suggest you spend a little time exploring the Hub so you are familiar with what it contains. You will find links for every area of the curriculum. You can encourage your child to spend time on Hub activities and links if you are looking for more home learning.

Class Seesaw:

Each class will have a seesaw account to share your child's learning through photos and videos. We will share learning stories here and the children will learn how to post their own learning moments to share with you. You will get a QR code to scan for yourself to connect to your child. You will also get one your child can use if they want to work on it at home. Please note they will use a different app to you.

School App/Facebook:

Don't forget to sign up to the school app and our school facebook page to keep up to date. When you join the app click on the menu in the top left corner. Click on Alert Subscriptions then select all the sports your child plays and all the classes in your child's whanau group eg Year 5/6 Team. This will mean you will only get alerts that you need. You may need to update the groups you have ticked at the moment!
